## 1.1 Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 Programmes for which syllabus revision was carried out during the Academic year

Response: Yes. The Institute has a systematic process for design, development and frequent review of the curriculum. The syllabus of various courses is reviewed and revised every 5 years by the concerned faculty member by involving external experts in the concerned courses. For each of the core course subjects, a subcommittee of the concerned teachers along with external experts in that subject is formed. This sub-committee reviews the current syllabus and recommends appropriate revisions to update the course content to keep pace with the latest developments / trends in that subject. The sub-committee also reviews the reference / reading lists for the subject and recommends appropriate changes to reflect the proposed new syllabus. The sub-committee then gives a report to the Dean, Academic Affairs.

The reports of all such sub-committees are then presented by the Dean to the Academic Council for deliberations and final approval. The concerned teachers also brief the Academic Council on the logic / reasoning behind the changes recommended by the sub-committees.

Following the approval of the Academic Council, the new syllabus comes into force from the subsequent Academic Year. With regard to the Optional Courses, it must be noted that these courses are based primarily on the research interests of individual faculty members who are offering these courses. Hence, for the Optional Courses, the design and content are largely left to the judgement of the teacher offering that course.

- 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment
- 6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each):
  - + Curriculum Development

The Institute has a systematic process for design, development and frequent review of the curriculum. The syllabus of various courses is reviewed and revised every 5 years by the concerned faculty member by involving external experts in the concerned courses.

For each of the core course subjects, a sub-committee of the concerned teachers along with external experts in that subject is formed. This sub-committee reviews the current syllabus and recommends appropriate revisions to update the course content to keep pace with the latest developments / trends in that subject. The sub-committee also reviews the reference / reading lists for the subject and recommends appropriate changes to reflect the proposed new syllabus. The sub-committee then gives a report to the Dean, Academic Affairs.

The reports of all such sub-committees are then presented by the Dean to the Academic Council for deliberations and final approval. The concerned teachers also brief the Academic Council on the logic / reasoning behind the changes recommended by the sub-committees. Following the approval of the Academic Council, the new syllabus comes into force from the subsequent Academic Year. With regard to the Optional Courses, it must be noted that these courses are based primarily on the research interests of individual faculty members who are offering these courses. Hence, for the Optional Courses, the design and content are largely left to the judgement of the teacher offering that course.

## + Teaching and Learning

Over the years, IGIDR as an organization has evolved to become a full-fledged teaching cum research institution. The strength of IGIDR lies in its interdisciplinary approach to teaching and research right from the Masters level to the Ph.D. programme. ## Formation of IGIDR Ethics Committee (IREC)

Objectives of the Practice: To ensure that researchers are fully aware of the ethical issues, especially those involving survey works of human subjects and that they maintain high standards in dealing with human response in primary data collection.

A set of guidelines are given as below:

- 1. Researchers must show respect for human dignity in research process.
- 2. Researchers have an obligation to respect integrity, freedom and right to participate or refuse of the participants. The participants have the right to withdraw from participation anytime, without this entailing any negative consequence for them.
- 3. Participants should be provided all the information, so that they are fully aware of subject matter of the research and the consequences of participating in the research project.
- 4. Parental /guardian consent is required when children under the age of 15 will be taking part in the survey.
- 5. Participants' privacy should be given due respect. Information about the private lives will be treated confidentially. Anonymity will be maintained in dealing with the individuals. Personal data collected for a particular research purpose should not be used for other research or commercial purpose.
- 6.Data that identify the participants will be stored carefully and responsibly.
- 7.Researchers accept the responsibility for protecting the interests of vulnerable groups in the entire research process.
- 8. The research should be carried out in compliance with local customs, standards, laws and regulations.

The Context: Anyone who wants to do a survey for research should apply to this committee with their proposal, questionnaire and other requisite documents that the committee may prescribe/require. The committee will then review these documents to ensure that they follow the guidelines set by the committee. For scrutinizing the proposals, the committee may consist of internal members and one external expert. In deciding the external expert the committee may seek suggestions from concerned researchers (student thesis committee supervisors/members), without in any way being restricted by such suggestions. The guidelines are included in the 'Research Methodology' course as part of the syllabus. M. Phil and Ph.D. students are required to take this course, and hence will learn the principles of ethics in research involving human subjects.

The Practice: The committee meets twice a year, September and March to scrutinize the proposals and give recommendations on whether the proposal has complied with the guidelines in all respects. Only the proposals, which represent either ongoing work or to be undertaken in the future, will be taken up for examination and recommendation. Every survey work to be conducted or coordinated by a researcher attached to IGIDR, faculty or students, directly or indirectly involving external researchers / institutions / agencies, etc., will have to be recommended by the ethics committee to the Director before the actual survey is undertaken.

#### Visiting Students Programme 2017

Application were invited for the Visiting Students Program for 2017 which is a part of the Institute's mandate to reach out to students outside the Institute, to foster interactions and nurture the capacity of students to undertake research. Selected students were assigned a Faculty Supervisor to work with for the duration of their visit.
